Welcome to kindergarten! Kindergarten is such a special time when students get introduced to school. I hope you are looking forward to this year as much as I am! We are going to learn and grow together. In order to get our year off to a great start, I have included some information I felt might be important for you to know. All the BLUE forms in this packet need to be returned. Thanks.

Dismissal is 3:35. Kindergarteners will be picked up at the Kindergarten playground wall. *Please send two snacks with your child each day. This is very important. Students do not learn well when they are hungry.

*It is normal and age appropriate behavior for new full day Kindergarteners to take until Halloween, Thanksgiving, or even Christmas to adjust to the full day schedule. They may come home tired, hungry and not want to come back all day, every day. Even some tears is normal Kindergarten and First grade behavior. Consistency is KEY and will help with a smoother transition.

Personal Items Please do not allow your child to bring toys or other personal items to school. Such items are a distraction and take away from valuable learning time.

Homework

Your child will have weekly homework. The homework activities may vary from week to week. Students will also record monthly reading minutes on a reading minute sheet. Students are expected to read at home for 15 minutes each day. Reading



minutes count both when you read to your child (before your child can read) and when your child reads to you (when the child can read). All homework will be sent home on Monday and returned completed on Thursday. Just as important as the actual homework are the habits of responsibility and accountability learned by doing and returning the homework. Please support your child in learning these values.

Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Curriculum

In order to help young learners with the skills they need to read, our school is using the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Curriculum. Phonemic awareness is an understanding that spoken words are broken into individual sounds, or phonemes. Young learners need these basic skills in order to become successful readers. Every day we will work as a whole group on these skills: rhyming, beginning sounds, blending, final

sounds, segmenting, adding and deleting sounds, substituting sounds, letter naming and language awareness.

Take Home Books

After I establish reading levels, I will be sending home take home reading in homework folders. Each student will receive two books to read at home. These books will be at your student's independent reading level, which means they should be able to read it without much assistance from you. Please initial next to the book your child has read so that I know to send home the next books. A notebook to write one sentence about the book for comprehension will be sent home along with the take home book.

Parent Volunteers

Parent volunteers are welcome and encouraged. I have an open door policy in my classroom and would love for you to come and interact with your child and his/her peers in our classroom and see what goes on during a busy Kindergarten day. If you are interested in volunteering, please fill out the volunteer preferences sheet and return it to school. Please remember that consistency and confidentiality are important. Before a parent or visitor enters the classroom, he/she MUST check in at the office. If you plan to volunteer, please make sure you are signed up in Skyward so that you are able to check in at the office on the laptop. Please ask the office what you need to do to be fingerprinted and background checked so that you can go as a volunteer on the zoo fieldtrip and work with students in the hallway. This new volunteer status is good for several years.

Birthday Treats

Each child will be recognized on or close to his/her birthday. Your child is welcome to celebrate by bringing commercially packaged treats for the class. Treats will be passed out at the end of the school day. Please no treats that contain peanuts or tree nuts in case of allergies in our class.



Star Student:

Each week a different child will be the "Star of the week" in our class. Your child may bring a personal poster to school on Monday or use the poster page you are asked to complete and return. You may use this in place of a personal poster, we will compile these pages into a class book. Students with summer or holiday birthdays will be assigned a week.

Weather

Please watch the weather forecast and dress your child accordingly. Please put your child's name on any items that are brought to school. During extremely cold weather, the children will come in early or stay in during recess.




Attendance:



In order to guarantee your child will be provided the excellent learning climate he/ she deserves, I am utilizing the following discipline plan.

I believe that all students can behave appropriately in the classroom. Each student has the right to learn without interruptions and/or disruptions from others in a classroom where he/she feels safe and valued. In order to provide the most effective learning environment the rules are as follows:

- 1. Follow adult directions the first time
- Respect adults, peers, and property.
- 3. Keep hands, feet, objects, and hurtful words to yourself.
- Be prepared.
- 5. Be where you are supposed to be.

Positive Consequences:

- *Feel good consequence child feels happy when the rules are followed.
- *My teacher and others will know I am doing my best.
- *Individual recognition positive verbal reinforcement, stay at my table, secret student, prize box, blue/gold tickets.
- *Class rewards

Consequences:

- *Verbal warning-no consequence
- *Green card changed to a yellow card Seat away.
- *Yellow card changed to a red card Last in line that day. Miss 30 seconds of recess then they can play.
- *Red card changed to Orange card- They call home.
- *Students start on the green card each day.

Students also work to earn a fun activity on Friday. They do this by staying on the green card. If a child moves to a red card any three days in a week, they will not be allowed to attend the activity and will have to earn the activity back the next week.

The Wellness Center is a place where students can learn to regulate emotions and deal with issues outside of class. The Wellness center staff can help students work through issues to be able to come back to class ready to learn

Voluntary Classroom Donations


While every child will always be provided all essential school

Staying Safe

In addition to our classroom rules this year, we have some supplemental rules about staying safe. This is a whole new experience for all of us, and the kindergarten team is implementing some safety rules to follow in order to help everyone stay safe and feel safe at school. These are the safety rules we will be following this year:

- I can keep a safe distance from others.
- 2. I can wear my mask the correct way.
- 3. I can keep my supplies in my own box.
- I can keep my hands clean by using hand sanitizer.
- 5. I can use soap and wash my hands for one minute.
- 6. I can cover my cough or sneeze with my elbow.
- 7. I can keep my desk and area clean.
- I can blow my nose with a tissue.
- I can keep my hands away from my face.
- 10.I can stay home if I am sick.

If a child becomes sick, they should stay home. Students who exhibit sick symptoms at school will be placed in an isolated sick room and parents will be called to come pick them up from school. The Jordan School District and Monte Vista will be following guidelines from the state health department if a student tests positive for Covid-19.
