


Personal Items

Homework

Your child will have weekly homework. The homework activities will be similar each week comprising of:


- reading 15 minutes each day
- 🖾 understanding and using each week's phonics spelling skill
- 🛱 reading and understanding academic vocabulary
- math skills
- 🛱 fluency and comprehension practice



Just as important as the actual homework are the habits of responsibility and accountability learned by doing and returning the homework. Please support your child in learning these values. It is often helpful to have a specific "homework spot" at home where your student can do his/her homework and where necessary items like paper, pencils, and crayons are kept.

Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Curriculum

In order to help young learners with the skills they need to read, our school is using the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Curriculum. Phonemic awareness is an understanding that spoken words are broken into individual sounds, or phonemes. Young learners need these basic skills in order to become successful readers. Every day we will work as a whole group on these skills: rhyming, beginning sounds, blending, final sounds,



segmenting, adding and deleting sounds, substituting sounds, letter naming and language awareness.

Wit and Wisdom

This is a new program to the Jordan School District which aims to help students gain deeper knowledge and comprehension skills through questions and group work. This will be the program we will be using for language arts and comprehension skills.



Parent Volunteers

Parent volunteers are welcome and encouraged. I have an open door policy in my classroom and would love for you to come and interact with your child and his/her peers in our classroom and see what goes on during our day. If you are interested in volunteering, please fill out the volunteer preferences sheet and return it to school. Please remember that consistency and confidentiality are important. Before a parent or visitor ever enters the classroom, he/she MUST check in at the office. If you would like to volunteer it is optimal to have had a background and fingerprinting check with the district. This only needs to be done once and then you are able to work in small groups with students as well as attend field trips.

<u>Birthday Treats</u>

We will celebrate birthdays here at school. Students who have birthdays during school holidays or summer break will have a chance to celebrate their birthday sometime during the school year. You are more than welcome to bring or send in INDIVIDUALLY WRAPPED treats. Treats will be passed out at the end of the school day. The State Health Department dictates that no homemade treats come to school for



distribution to the class. Please no treats that contain peanuts in case of allergies in our class.

Another note: Please <u>do not</u> plan on having your student pass out birthday party invitations at school UNLESS you are inviting everyone in the class. It is usually impossible to invite all the students in the class and we want to avoid hurting any feelings because a student was not invited.

<u>Weather</u>

Please watch the weather forecast and dress your child accordingly.

Sometimes children come to school without the warm clothing that they should be wearing outside. Please <u>put your child's name</u> on any items that are brought to school. During extremely cold or wet weather, the children will come in early or stay in during recess. But if at all possible, they will be outside.

Tardies

It is extremely important that students arrive at school on time. The best learning time is early in the day and I do not want your child to miss this important instruction time. Young children are most successful when they are able to take part in routines. Help set the tone for your child's day by having him/her to school on time. Tardy students also become a distraction to the rest of the class.


Absences

In order to guarantee that your child will be provided the excellent learning climate he/she deserves, I am utilizing the "Mustang Five" plan which will be implemented throughout the school.

I believe that all students can behave appropriately in the classroom. Each student has the right to learn without interruptions and/or disruptions from others in a classroom where he/she feels safe and valued. In order to provide the most effective learning environment the rules are as follows:

- I. Follow adult directions the first time.
- 2. Respect yourself, adults, peers, and property.
- 3. Keep hands, feet, objects, and hurtful words to yourself.
- 4. Be prepared.
- 5. Be where you are supposed to be.

I greatly believe in positive consequences or rewards for a job well done. I feel that the most effective motivator for young children is praise. In addition, you may hear your child talk about the "Compliments", and "putting your name in the drawing" which are individual and whole class reward systems that we will use this year. Monte Vista is also introduction the "Portrait of a Graduate" program this year. This program focuses on qualities of successful graduate.




